C. OUTLINE OF MAJOR CONTENT AREAS

- 1. The focus is on applying critical thinking skills to economic problems.
- 2. The problem of scarcity is discussed as it relates to various groups in society.
- 3. Given the problem of scarcity, choosing among alternative is necessary and every choice entail a cost.
- 4. Understand how prices allocate resources in the United States economy.
- 5. Understand and evaluate the role of government in a mixed economy when markets fail.
- 6. Analyze Labor markets and income distribution.
- 7. Macroeconomic topic include: calculating the output of the economy (GDP), business cycles, inflation, unemployment, the deficit, national debt, and fiscal & monetary policy.
- 8. International trade and associated issues

- 1. Students will recognize and define the question upon which a controversy depends.
- 2. Students will be able to distinguish arguments from non-arguments.
- 3. Students will be able to identify the implicit assumptions and practical implications of multiple perspectives so that arguments can be analyzed within their historical and cultural contexts.
- 4. Students will understand the difference between inductive and deductive reasoning as well as fallacious and non-fallacious arguments.
- 5. Students will recognize and critically assess cultural images and stereotypes.
- 6. Students will construct sound arguments supported with data and properly credit ideas.
- 7. Students will clearly formulate a question and generate alternative hypothesis and solutions to the question with consideration given to the cultural context of the question.
