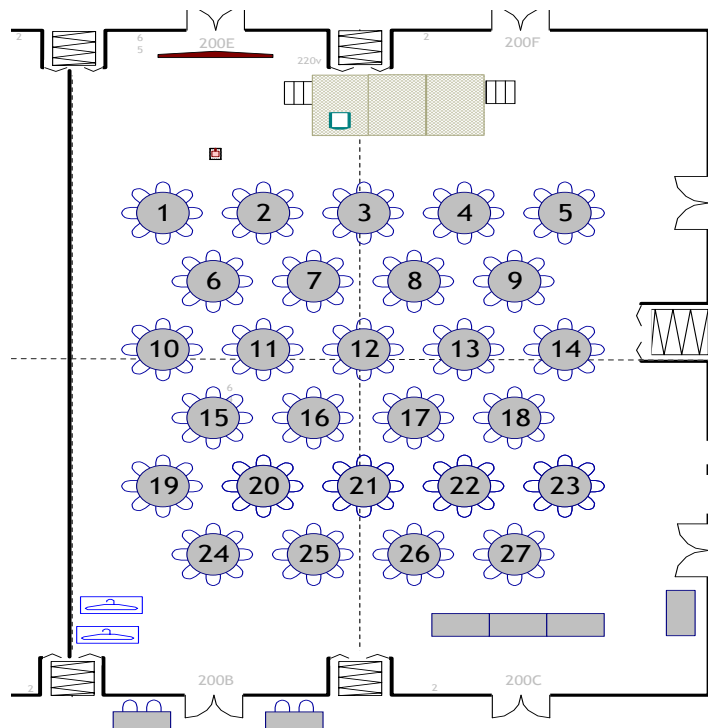

FAQ's about the FDC (Faculty Development Center)

What is the mission of the FDC?

The Faculty Development Center facilitates collective faculty efforts to collaborate and innovate, and offers opportunities to increase individual faculty effectiveness, engagement, and professional well being.

Where is the FDC and why do I need my key card to get in?

The entrance to the FDC is the left door inside the north entrance to the Library. It is largely a student-free zone so only faculty and staff have key card access.

What happens at the FDC?

Scheduled faculty development sessions, webinars, IT workshops, planning meetings; unscheduled gatherings in the “living room”, quiet work places for any faculty (including adjuncts and faculty on sabbatical), coffee/tea breaks, collaborative work spaces

Who does the work of the FDC?

Beginning in Spring 2013, the Faculty Development Coordinator was designated to be a 75% time 2-year reassignment position for a tenured faculty member. Alison Wallace (Biosciences Department) serves as the current coordinator. Nancy Githii, a Counseling and Student Affairs graduate student, works a few hours a week to help with event planning and logistics. The Faculty Development Committee provides guidance for planning and decision-making, and helps execute large events.

Who decides the sessions and programs offered by the FDC?

The Faculty! Suggestions are taken from any faculty member and from Faculty Development Committee members. If you have an idea, pitch it to any of the Committee members or the Faculty Development Coordinator and the Coordinator will help organize and promote collaborative meetings, development sessions, and faculty development-related events.

What is a Faculty Development Associate and how do I become one?

Teams of 2-4 faculty members can apply for funding to attend a workshop or conference together if they agree to facilitate a series of 3-4 faculty development sessions in the semester immediately following the conference. At least one team member must have helped facilitate a mini-session (a one-time discussion or presentation on a topic of their choice) during the semester of their application. Please explain the Two-thirty Teas...

What are they? A time to take a break from your office, lab, classroom, or studio, and get together with your colleagues for some mid-afternoon refreshments and exchange of ideas.

Why tea? Hot water can be heated up quickly and it is “free”. The coffee pot is ready to go if people wish to have coffee (which is a waste to make ahead of time if we are unsure whether people will drink it).

What happens? On some days, topics will be suggested and articles will be provided, but other days will be completely open. People can grab some tea or coffee and a snack and gather in the “living room”. Article links and brief summaries will be posted after most teas on the FDC blog.

What will there be to eat? Whatever is donated to the Faculty Development Center “pantry”. We cannot use our budget for food items so we rely on donations. Coffee, tea, cookies, chips, crackers, cheese, trail mix, granola bars, apples, carrots, chocolate, etc. are all welcome at any time.

What time does it start? 2:30! But really you can come anytime around 2:30. If you have a class that ends at 2:45, come on over because most likely people will still be around.

Why should I come? For SO many reasons! First of all, it is bad for your health to sit too long, and hard on your eyes to stare at a computer screen without taking frequent breaks. Walking to another building helps clear your mind. Meeting colleagues from other departments and colleges may stimulate you to think about your courses and your scholarly work in new ways. From a personal health perspective, hydrating your body and supplying it with healthy snacks is never a bad thing! Finally, prevailing ecological theories state that ecosystems are more resilient in the face of changes when there are multiple interactions between a diverse set of organisms and their environments. I think this idea also applies to organizations, including MSUM.
